2. State Symbols

- A. Name the **State Bird**: Robin; **Flower**: Apple Blossom; **Fish**: Trout; **Tree**: White Pine; and **Stone**: Petoskey.
- B. What is the State Motto and why is it unique to the State of Michigan?

The State Motto is "Si Quaeris Peninsulan Amoenam Circumspice" which means "If you seek a pleasant peninsula, look about you." Originally adopted by the Michigan Legislature in 1835, it is unique to Michigan because it is the only state in the United States with two peninsulas (upper and lower).

3. State History

- A. What city was claimed by both Michigan and Ohio, delaying statehood? When did Michigan enter the Union?

The City of Toledo was claimed by both Michigan and Ohio, causing a dispute between the states that lasted two years and delayed the statehood for Michigan. Michigan finally agreed to relinquish Toledo in exchange for the western portion of the Upper Peninsula. Michigan, as the 26th state, entered the Union in 1837 as the largest state east of the Mississippi.

- Historical place examples: Ft. Detroit; Ft. Michilimackinac; The Henry Ford.
 - Reenactment events: Chief Pontiac Trail Scout Rendezvous – Camp Agawam; Colonial Kensington – Kensington Metro park; Voyager Days – Metro Beach Metropark; River of Time – Bay City; Feast of St. Clair – St. Clair; County Fairs with threshing demonstrations and farm life activities; Train museums; Blue & Gray Civil War encampments; Lumbering festivals; Living History Show; Pinegrove museum in Pontiac; Boy Scout museum – Washington, MI.

- B. Tell about the history and customs of American Indians who lived in Michigan near your community.

Some Indian Tribes living in Michigan were the Ottawa, Potawatomi, Iroquois, Chippewa, Algonquin, Huron, and Menominee. Many famous Indian Chiefs came from this area; Chief Pontiac being one, for whom Pontiac, Michigan is named. There are many cities, counties, parks, and landmarks in our state that have Indian names.
